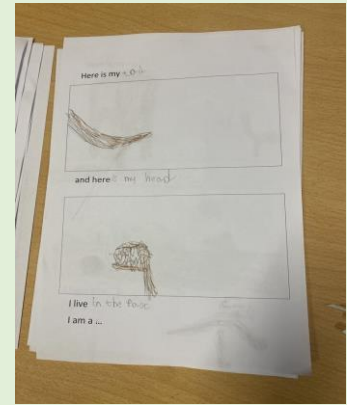
### *Werribee Zoo-Excursion* (Friday 17th June)

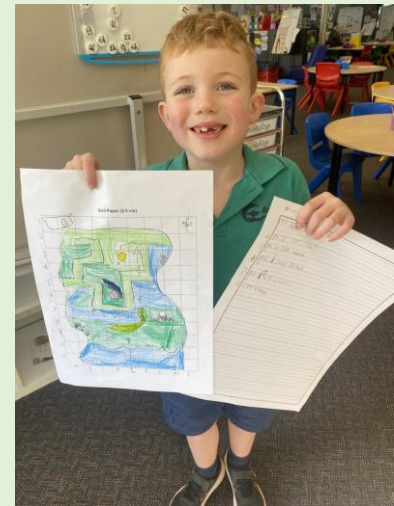
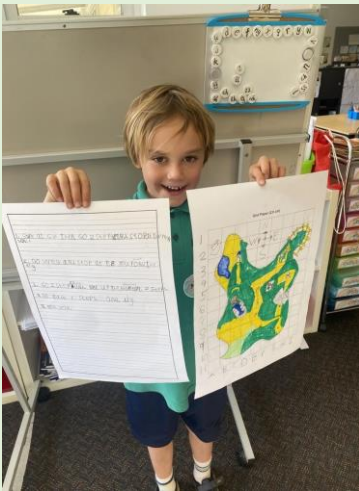
## ***King Parrots- Pecking through learning***



This week in Literacy the King Parrots created a class book inspired by the text 'Animal Clues'. Students selected an animal to focus on and created clues for the reader to guess their chosen animal. Their clues included written details of their appearance and where they lived, along with illustrations for the reader to zoom in to.



In Maths the King Parrots have been focusing on giving and following directions to locations. Students developed their understanding that people need to give and follow directions to and from a place, and that this involves turns, direction and distance. To demonstrate their understanding students created their own treasure map using grid paper. They then used their knowledge of cardinal points and grid references to write explicit directions to the treasure.



## ***Piranhas - Snap up Success***

Over the last couple of week's the Piranhas have been learning all about the brain! Our learning intention was to use scientific vocabulary and learn new facts about how the brain works. Here are some activities we completed to help us be successful. We designed lab coats to help us look like brain doctors!

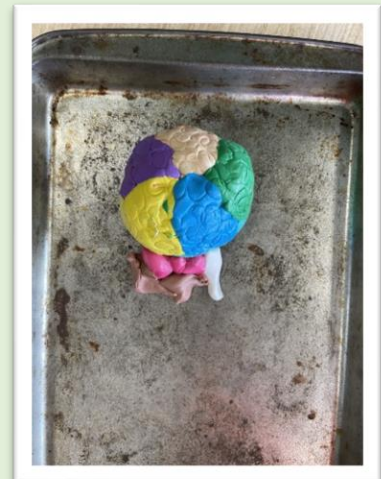




Next, we learnt about the nervous system. After reading nonfiction books and watching videos about the nervous system, we created our very own nervous systems and in collaborative groups wrote the new facts we learnt.



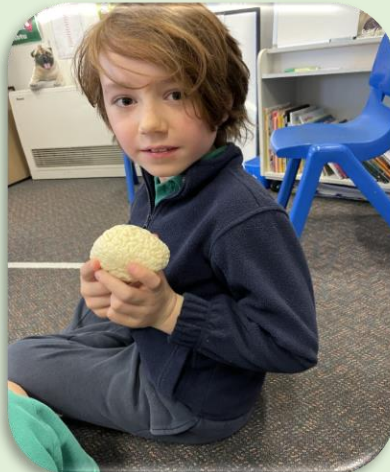
We then learnt what the brain looks like and used posters and images to help us understand that the brain has different lobes used to control different functions of the body. We used clay to make models of the brain and learn the names of some of its lobes. For example, cerebellum, frontal lobe, brain stem and spinal cord.





Finally, we drew the brain and made lift up flaps to write what body function that part of the brain is responsible for.

It was very exciting and interesting to have parent Cam Shaw come and talk to the Piranhas about the brain! The Piranhas were able to look at MRI images, 3D brains and some tools he uses whilst at work. Students all had Cam check their reflexes and feel the vibrations of a tuning fork. A BIG thank you to Cam for taking the time to prepare his talk and spend time teaching the Piranhas. We all had a fun time.

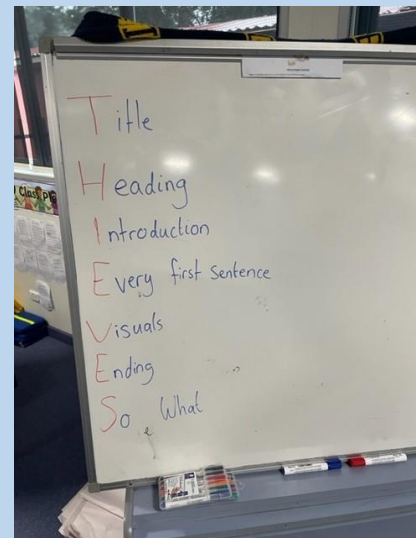




## Senior Community News

### Reading

This week in the 5/6s students have continued to learn about the Reading Power strategy 'Determining Importance'. Determining Importance is an important skill for students to use when reading non-fiction texts. Students have started to use the THIEVES strategy (Title, Headings, Introduction, Every first sentence, Visuals, Endings, So What? {questions about the text}) which helps students to know which parts of the text to zoom into to determine what the important information is. This helps students to skim read for important information which helps with summarising texts.



### Science

In Science the Grade 5 and 6 students have been looking at states of matter. The students were provided with a variety of different experiments such as melted chocolate, salt in a glass of water, a litre of frozen milk and finally bicarb soda mixed with tartaric acid in water. Once all of the students had watched each experiment, we held a discussion to understand if the states of matter were able to be reversed back into their original state. This was a great hands on activity for the students to participate in.

### **Coding Club**

This week in Coding Club the students got to put their robotic creations to the test! Last week the students



constructed a bridge that this week they challenged themselves to drive their robots over. After some relentless attempts and a few mechanical issues, the students were able to successfully drive their robot from one end of the bridge to the other. It was a great achievement for the students as it was a challenge that they had been working towards accomplishing for weeks. Next term in Coding Club we will be coming up with a new exciting challenge that the students will work towards accomplishing.



### **At Home Reading**

We encourage every child to read for at least 20 minutes at home every day. This helps to build fluency, reading skills and strategies that your child is working on in class and helps to foster a love for reading.

### **SMART Spelling (Grade 5/6)**

Miss Fleur's Group: the graph /c/ making the sound "s" as in city. It's often followed by the letters /e/, /i/ or /y/.

Mr A's Group: the digram /ti/ making the sound "sh" as in station

## FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

### INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

#### CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students

#### HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from the website below.

If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- **new student enrolments**; your child has started or changed schools this year.
- **changed family circumstances**; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.
