It's been another fun and busy week of learning in the JLC. Below is a snapshot of our week.

This week in Reading, the Wallabies 'zoomed in' to nouns and adjectives used by Roald Dahl to describe the BFG and Miss Trunchbull. They also viewed the beginning of the movie The BFG and used nouns and adjectives to describe the setting. In Writing, students drew a picture of themselves in their 'Book Week' costume. Next, they labelled the different parts of their costume using nouns and adjectives to give a detailed description for their reader. For Sounds Write (spelling- extended code) the Wallabies focused on the different sounds of ee (e, ee, ea, y). In Word Study, students made homophones (two or more words having the same pronunciation but different meanings and spelling) with the sounds of ae linked to their 'Sounds Write' spelling from last week. For example, main/mane, steak/stake and pane/pain.


## Piranhas- Snapping up Success

Over the last couple of weeks, the Piranhas have been practising telling o'clock, half past, quarter past and quarter to times on analogue and digital clocks. Students have watched videos, made their own clocks and played games to help them remember how to read clocks. Students also completed their seasons posters. We used calendars to learn to read how many days in each month and when the first and last day of the month is.


In Reading and Spelling students continue to participate in the Sounds Write lessons. We have been building on our knowledge of digraphs and are now focusing on the 'th' (unvoiced) spelling. Students have been word building, segmenting and blending words such as 'theft, thank and thud', as well as playing sound swap nonsense word games. For dictation, students have been writing sentences using double consonants such as 'ff' and 'II' and also focusing on learning to use punctuation such as 'talking marks' and apostrophes correctly.

## Persistent Puppies and King Parrots

This week in Maths the King Parrots and the Puppies have been collaborating to learn about Australian coins. They have been learning to

recognise and order coins according to their value and have discovered

where and how coins are made. The students created their own money bags and did coin rubbings.

## MINI FETE - 2022

Attention families, after a two-year hiatus the Anglesea Primary School Mini Fete returns!
For new families to the school, the Mini Fete is a school run fete held at the end of term 3 (Thursday 15th September) between $10 \mathrm{am}-12: 30 \mathrm{pm}$. The stalls and activities at the Mini-Fete are run by students and staff for the students and school community. All the proceeds of the Mini-Fete go towards the school with the funds used on projects or equipment decided by the Student Voice Leaders and Student Voice representatives. The allocation of funds for this year are yet to be confirmed. In the past the Mini-Fete profits have paid for the purchase and installation of our second flagpole (Aboriginal Flag) and purchasing more sporting equipment.

On the day, students will arrive at school at the normal time dressed in a sporting teams colours or uniform with a gold coin donation for Footy Colours Day which raises money for Fight Cancer Foundation. The fete commences at 10am with students being rostered on to work at stalls throughout the fete. The fete will wrap up around 12:30pm with winners from the different activities announced. The Sausage sizzle orders (pre-orders only) will be delivered to home groups at lunch time. Students and staff will work together to clean up the school and rearrange classrooms. Home time will be at the usual time of 3:30pm.
Although there is food available to buy, we encourage all students to still bring their regular recess and lunch foods.

This year there will be a wide range of stalls and activities for students and visitors to partake in. There will be a range of different food options from fruit sticks, popcorn, milkshakes and sausage sizzle to Poffertjes (Dutch pancakes). Some of the activities include games of chance, DISCO, video arcade, paper airplane contest, mini golf, number of basketball shots in a minute and many more.

Prices for the stalls and activities varies from 20cents to around $\$ 2$. If your child/ren are to come to school on the day with around $\$ 10$ to spend, that will allow them to have plenty of spending money for food and activities.

## Coding Club

This term, we have continued running the lunchtime Coding Club. These sessions are to provide students who are keen to learn about coding the opportunity to do so for 25 minutes every Tuesday lunchtime. Throughout our coding sessions, students have worked carefully to create a robot that will be able to complete the obstacle course that the students have designed and will soon create. It has been great during the Coding Club to see the students working collaboratively in a kind and respectful manner.

## Maths

The grade $5 / 6$ s are currently exploring a fractions unit, beginning with finding strategies to find equivalent fractions and compare fractions. On Tuesday, the students participated in a task called 'Choose your own NBA team'. The students were provided with statistics (In the form of fractions) for players in different positions in the NBA (Basketball). The students had to analyse the data for each of the players in each of the positions, then determine the players they wanted to pick for their team. They had to justify why they had chosen each player by referencing the strategies they used to compare the fractions. The students had this to say about the task:

- Fletcher: "This was the most fun and engaging math task ever! We got to learn about a topic I am interested in and it was fun converting the fractions into percentages for the players statistics."
- Casper: "It was very fun and creative because we had a lot of options to choose from, we could create our own team, name it and design a logo. I could choose the task where I was able to compare the fractions easily and choose my team from there."
- Macie: "I like how we could use different strategies to compare the fractions of the players statistics. The task was really engaging because we could have fun as well, by creating the name for the team, designing a logo and choosing the players for our own team."
- Mary: "I chose the hard version and it was good because it challenged me. It was not only fractions, but I also got to compare the data and I learnt a lot from it. I learnt how to convert fractions into decimals by dividing the numerator by the denominator. I could also use my other strategies to compare the fractions too."
