Eating time at school

Eating time is an important part of each school day, with students having supervised time to eat snacks at both recess and lunch. Our classroom teachers do a great job in supervising this process, including often encouraging students to eat (rather than chat) during this time. Younger students are also supported with extra eating time if needed. All students know that they are not permitted to take food out with them during designated recess breaks and overall, they adhere well to this rule. This helps with minimising litter, managing food allergies, and the active supervision of all food. We had a great discussion about the support given to eating processes at our most recent School Council meeting. We at Anglesea Primary School want to ensure all students eat the food given to them from home, as we are aware that families put a lot of effort and money into making sure their child has enough food to get them through a busy day. If you feel your child is not eating all the food you send, we recommend firstly a conversation with the child, and then, if needed, a conversation with the classroom teacher. On the flip side, if your child finishes all their food and is still hungry, we recommend they speak to their teacher, as we always have extra supplies from Foodbank, our fabulous Breakfast program suppliers. Thank you for your ongoing support.

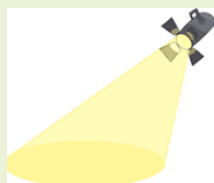

Vegetables

When vegetables start to turn lack-lustre, they sadly end up in the bin sooner than expected. Don't let your fridge crisper drawer become a graveyard for once vibrant veg. As part of our FEAST program (Inquiry/STEM unit) the Year 5/6 students this week continued their exploration of the issue of food waste and its environmental impact. Students brainstormed ways they could avoid letting vegetables go to waste in their homes and in groups created a delicious soup recipe using these otherwise discarded ingredients. It was great to see the passion, creativity and collaboration used by our students on Thursday. A big thank you to our ES staff Cathy and Taylah for all their assistance, this program couldn't happen without them!



FEAST-Maths Keeping it Real -Senior S

This week we sorted information (weight, height, shoe size, temperature, favourite vegie etc) into discrete(count) or continuous (measurement) data. Then as a continuation of our work on collecting and graphing data, students used their skills in an authentic way. Linked to our OzHarvest FEAST program, students interpreted and analysed their 'Food Waste Audits' and graphed the information into a discrete graph of their choice (bar, pie, column) displaying the percentage of foods mostly wasted in Senior S.

Work Time

The 1967 Referendum- Text Analysis

Angle and Perspective
Indigenous man appears bigger
Emphasizing the cause.

Framing
Extreme close up of a child -creates an emotive response.

Body Language and Gaze
Holding hands and smiling-a spring in their step. Equal in stature, clothing which is what the campaign is about.

Vectors- we are drawn to the eye gaze and not the background.

Colour
Black and white is more emotive and there is no colour to distract.

Senior S also looked at the 1967 referendum, and consolidated our understanding of the constitution, the bill, referendum and secret ballot. We acknowledged Reconciliation Week and the 25th anniversary since the Sydney Harbour Bridge walk for Reconciliation.
